How to Conjugate "Faire" (To Do, Make) in French

24 How to Conjugate "Faire" in French (Present) 

FAIRE (PRESENT TENSE)

- je fais (I do / I make or I'm doing / I'm making)
- tu fais (you do / make or you're doing)
- il fait (he's doing)
- elle fait (she's doing)
- on fait (we're doing, informal)
- nous faisons (we're doing)
- vous faites (you're doing)
- ils font (they're doing)
- elles font (they're doing)

EXAMPLES

- Je fais mes devoirs. (I'm doing my homework.)
- Tu fais quoi ? (What are you doing?)
- Il fait la cuisine. (He's cooking.)

- Elle fait du sport. (She's exercising.)
- On fait le ménage. (We're doing the cleaning.)
- Nous faisons attention. (We're careful.)
- Vous faites les courses aujourd'hui? (Are you doing the grocery shopping today?)
- Ils font de la guitare. (They are playing guitar.)
- Elles font du tennis. (They are playing tennis.)

Some French expressions use the verb "faire" in French, even if "to do, to make" is not the verb used in the English translation.

Examples:

- *"faire le ménage" = to clean up*
- *"faire attention" = to be careful*
- *"faire de la randonnée" = to go hiking*
- *etc.*

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
